

Good Afternoon, San Diego County leaders.

With the new year underway, it's worth a few moments to forecast some of the big issues in the water world.

- Drought. We're coming off a very wet week locally and around the state, but overall it's
 been a very dry winter in many major watersheds. The past several dry months offer a good
 reminder of the investments that our region has made to ensure that even in multiple dry
 years, the San Diego region has enough water to sustain our economy and quality of life.
- Partnerships. We are proud to be a founding partner of a prestigious group of water agencies working with the Scripps Institution of Oceanography at UC San Diego to improve storm forecasting and reservoir management both locally and statewide.
- Detachment. Two of our member agencies are seeking to leave the Water Authority and
 join a Riverside County water agency, saying they want to save money to use for
 infrastructure upgrades. The Water Authority Board voted to oppose their detachment
 unless certain criteria were met, including no harm to our other ratepayers. If the agencies
 leave without covering payment obligations, then the rest of the water ratepayers across the
 county will pay more. That scenario particularly hurts disadvantaged communities.
 Currently, San Diego LAFCO is studying the issue, and we look forward to seeing those
 results.
- Infrastructure. We continue to make investments to ensure the reliability of our regional
 water system. We just completed one of the most complex pipeline projects in Water
 Authority history upgrading the treated water section of the First Aqueduct so that it
 continues to reliably serve the region for many more decades. Other major reliability
 projects are in process, all part of what residents and businesses pay for through their water
 bills to keep the water flowing through 310 miles of large-diameter pipes. These
 investments are necessary to support our region's residents and businesses by keeping the
 water flowing.

Thank you for your support during these challenging times as we work toward better days ahead.
